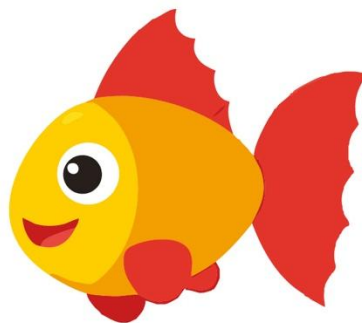
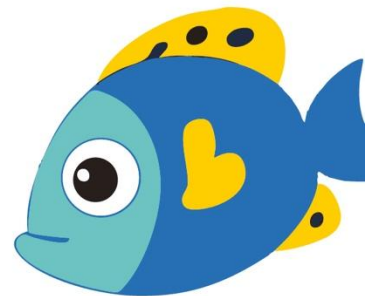
1, 2, 3, 4, 5 Once I Caught a Fish Alive



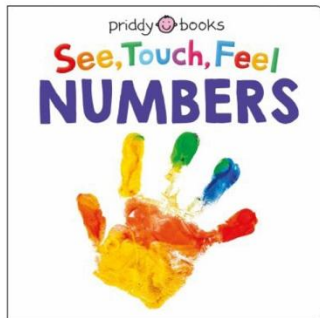
One, two, three, four, five,

Then I let it go again.



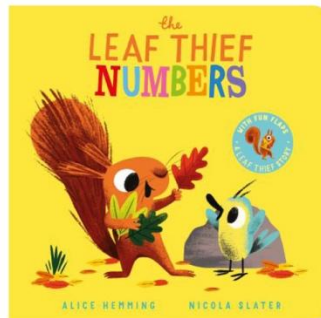
Why did you let it go?

This little finger on the right.



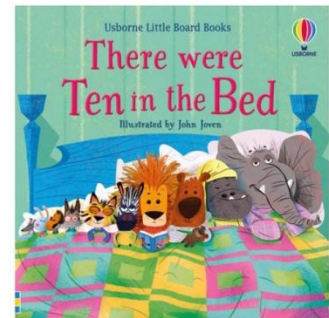
